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Overview: about the agency

Our strategic focus

The Stormwater Management Authority (the Authority) implements the *Agreement* on *Stormwater Management between the State of South Australia and the Local Government Association of South Australia*. The Authority supports the development and implementation of multi-objective stormwater management plans that address flood risk, environmental amenity and water security to maximise the public benefit of stormwater.

The Authority operates as a body for the planning, prioritisation and funding of stormwater management initiatives, and administers the Stormwater Management Fund which provides funding for stormwater planning and infrastructure projects that meet specific guidelines.

In collaboration with local government, the Authority drives a strategic and long-term approach to stormwater management across South Australia. In 2019-20 the Authority has pursued the following objectives:

- Stormwater planning and infrastructure investments target the highest priority areas of the State and appropriate levels of investment are leveraged across all stakeholders.
- Policy and legislative instruments support effective stormwater management, so as to maximise public value through social, environmental and economic outcomes, and require stormwater to be a key component of integrated urban water management across the State.
- All stakeholders are engaged effectively in stormwater management decision making and are informed about the role stormwater plays in integrated urban water management.

Our organisational structure

In accordance with section 7 of Schedule 1A to the *Local Government Act 1999*, the Authority consists of a board comprising one Presiding Member and not less than six other members.

Changes to the agency

During 2019-20 there were no changes to the Authority's structure and objectives as a result of internal reviews or machinery of government changes.

Our Minister

The board of the Authority is appointed by the Minister for Environment and Water, The Hon David Speirs MP.

Legislation administered by the agency

The Authority does not administer any legislation.

The Authority is responsible for complying with Schedule 1A to the *Local Government Act 1999*, which in 2019-20 was administered by the Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure.

The board of the Authority met on three occasions during the reporting period. (The board was in abeyance from 1 July 2019 to 22 September 2019.)

The Presiding Member met with and briefed the Minister for Environment and Water on one occasion.

In 2019-20, the board approved one stormwater management plan and approved Stormwater Management Fund subsidies of \$2.1 million in total.

Agency contribution to whole of Government objectives

In accordance with the principles outlined in the Agreement on Stormwater Management between the State of South Australia and the Local Government Association of South Australia, the Authority contributes to the quality of life enjoyed by all South Australians by funding plans and initiatives which reduce flood hazard, protect the quality of stormwater discharged to rivers and coastal environments and promote stormwater reuse to provide for urban amenity and water security.

The Authority administers the Stormwater Management Fund. Reporting of the Stormwater Management Fund is contained under the heading 'Reporting required under any other act or regulation'.

The Fund has been adequate to meet claims for stormwater initiatives and project commitments to date. However, through the completion of stormwater management plans and other initiatives, the Authority is aware of significant and emerging priorities for stormwater management and flood mitigation that are beyond the present capacity of the Fund.

In 2019-20 the Authority will continue to pay significant subsidies to the Brown Hill and Keswick Creeks Stormwater Board for the delivery of the works identified in the Brown Hill and Keswick Creeks Stormwater Management Plan. The overall delivery of these works is constrained by the capacity of the Authority and the constituent Councils to provide cash-flow. The cash balance of \$8.9 million at 30 June 2019, together with the state government contribution of \$5.7 million in 2019-20, is adequate to meet the negotiated commitment to the Brown Hill and Keswick Creeks Stormwater Board for 2020-21 as well as other outstanding payments at this time.

The forecast cash flows for the Fund will require the careful consideration and prioritisation of any potential new funding commitments in 2020-21.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT



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To the Presiding Member Stormwater Management Authority

Opinion

I have audited the financial report of Stormwater Management Authority for the financial year ended 30 June 2020.

In my opinion, the accompanying financial report gives a true and fair view of the financial position of the Stormwater Management Authority as at 30 June 2020, its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the Treasurer's Instructions issued under the provisions of the *Public Finance and Audit Act 1987* and Australian Accounting Standards.

Basis for opinion

I conducted the audit in accordance with the *Public Finance and Audit Act 1987* and Australian Auditing Standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the 'Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial report' section of my report. I am independent of the Stormwater Management Authority. The *Public Finance and Audit Act 1987* establishes the independence of the Auditor-General. In conducting the audit, the relevant ethical requirements of APES 110 *Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants* (including Independence Standards) have been met.

I believe that the audit evidence obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of the General Manager and the members of the Board for the financial report

The General Manager is responsible for the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view in accordance with the Treasurer's Instructions issued under the provisions of the *Public Finance and Audit Act 1987* and the Australian Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

The members of the Board are responsible for overseeing the entity's financial reporting process.

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Note 1 Basis of financial statements

1.1 Reporting Entity

The Stormwater Management Authority (the Authority) was established as a body corporate under the *Local Government Act 1999* on 1 July 2007.

The financial statements and accompanying notes include all the controlled activities of the Authority.

The Authority does not control any other entity and has no interests in unconsolidated structured entities.

1.2 Statement of compliance

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements prepared in compliance with:

- section 23 of the Public Finance and Audit Act 1987;
- Treasurer's Instructions and Accounting Policy Statements issued by the Treasurer under the Public Finance and Audit Act 1987; and
- relevant Australian Accounting Standards with reduced disclosure requirements.

The Authority has applied relevant Australian Accounting Standards that are applicable to not-for-profit entities, as the Authority is a not-for-profit entity.

For the 2019-20 financial statements the Authority adopted AASB 15 – Revenue from Contracts with Customers, AASB 16 – Leases and AASB 1058 – Income of Not-for-Profit Entities. Further information is provided in note 13.

Australian Accounting Standards that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet effective, have not been adopted by the Authority for the period ending 30 June 2020.

1.3 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared based on a 12-month period and presented in Australian currency. The historical cost convention is used unless a different measurement basis is specifically disclosed in the note associated with the item measured on a different basis.

All amounts in the financial statements and accompanying notes have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars (\$'000).

Assets and liabilities that are to be sold, consumed or realised as part of the normal operating cycle have been classified as current assets or current liabilities. All other assets and liabilities are classified as non-current.

Significant accounting policies are set out in the notes.

1.4 Taxation

The Authority is not subject to income tax. The Authority is liable for payroll tax, fringe benefits tax, goods and services tax (GST), emergency services levy, land tax equivalents and local government rate equivalents. Grant payments are not subject to GST.

Income, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except:

- when the GST incurred on a purchase of goods or services is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO), in which case the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item applicable;
- receivables and payables, which are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net GST receivable/ payable to the ATO is not recognised as a receivable/ payable in the Statement of Financial Position as the Authority is a member of an approved GST group of which the Department for Environment and Water (DEW) is responsible for the remittance and collection of GST. As such, there are no cash flows relating to GST transactions with the ATO in the Statement of Cash Flows.

Note 2 Objectives and activities

2.1 Objectives

The Authority is responsible for the implementation of the Stormwater Management Agreement between the State of South Australia and the Local Government Association.

2.2 Activities

The Authority provides funding toward the preparation of stormwater management plans; carrying out of works or the acquisition of land in accordance with an approved stormwater management plan or otherwise for the purpose of stormwater management; community education and awareness programs; projects or measures relating to water quality or pollution abatement; investigation, research, pilot programs or other projects relating to stormwater management and payment of the operation costs of the Authority.

Note 3 Remuneration of board members

The Authority, a statutory authority, was established as a body corporate under the *Local Government Act* 1999 on 1 July 2007. The Authority is governed by a 7-member board, including a Presiding Member, appointed by the Minister.

Note 13 Changes in accounting policy

The Authority did not voluntarily change any of its accounting policies in 2019-20.

AASB 16 Leases

AASB 16 Leases sets out a comprehensive model for lessee accounting that addresses recognition, measurement, presentation and disclosure of leases. Lessor accounting is largely unchanged. AASB 16 replaces AASB 117 Leases and related interpretations.

The Authority does not have lease arrangements during the financial year, meaning the adoption of AASB 16 did not have an impact on its financial statements.

AASB 15 Revenue for Contracts with Customers

AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers establishes a revenue recognition model for revenue arising from contracts with customers. AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities establishes new income recognition requirements for not-for-profit entities. Its requirements apply where the consideration to acquire an asset, including cash, is significantly less than fair value principally to the entity to further its objectives. AASB 1058 also contains requirements for the receipt of volunteer services. AASB 1058 supersedes income recognition requirements in AASB 1004 Contributions, AASB 118 Revenue and AASB 111 Construction Contracts. However, elements of AASB 1004 remain in place, primarily in relation to restructures of administrative arrangements and other contributions and distributions by owners.

Presentation of Financial Statements

Treasurer's Instructions (Accounting Policy Statements) issued on 1 June 2020 removed the previous requirement for financial statements to be prepared using the net cost of services format. The net cost of services is the total cost of services less any revenue retained by public authorities involved in the provision of services but does not include items classified as revenues from and payments to the South Australian Government.

Presentation of the Statement of Comprehensive Income on an 'income and expense' basis allows information to be presented in such a way that eliminates potential confusion as to the source of funding for the Authority. As well as changes to the format of the Statement of

Comprehensive Income, there are presentational changes to remove the net cost of services format from the Statement of Cash Flows. These statements now show income before expenses, and cash receipts before cash payments. Related disclosures also reflect this changed format.

Note 14 Events after the reporting period
